<i>Financial Literacy</i>	FL-TAXL-317	1	<b>FINANCIAL LITERACY FOR LAWYERS:</b> This course will provide an overview of general accounting concepts and principles for use by lawyers of all types, whether in the representation of clients or in their own firm or business. Audits and related services, financial statement analysis, and business valuation also will be discussed. The course will be largely problem-based and will include a number of real-world examples. <i>Florida Law Overview</i>	FL-BARP-315	1	<b>FLORIDA LAW OVERVIEW:</b> This course is designed to test knowledge and skills that every lawyer should be able to demonstrate prior to becoming licensed to practice law, such as the ability to (1) identify legal issues raised by a hypothetical factual situation; (2) separate material which is relevant from that which is not; (3) present a reasoned analysis of the relevant issues in a clear, concise, and well-organized composition; and (4) demonstrate an understanding of the fundamental legal principles relevant to the probable solution of the issues raised by the factual situation. Students will study on topics that include: Florida Civil Procedure, Florida Criminal Procedure, Florida Wills, Florida Business Entities, and Florida Evidence. <i>Immigration Considerations for the Criminal Defense Attorney (Exp Learning/Live Client)</i>	FL-INTL-316N	1	<b>IMMIGRATION CONSIDERATIONS FOR THE CRIMINAL DEFENSE ATTORNEY:</b> This course will provide a basic primer for the criminal attorney who represents an alien. The American Bar Association's Standards for Criminal Justice state " defense counsel should determine and advise the defendant sufficiently in advance of the entry of any plea, as to the possible collateral consequences that might ensue from entry of the contemplated plea." Students will learn to identify how small nuances in pleas can make a huge difference as to whether the client faces future deportation because of the arcane and specialized language used in immigration law. Specifically, students will learn to identify the immigration category of the charged crime; spot potential adverse immigration consequences resulting from convictions and "no contest" pleas such as ineligibility for a future visa, "green card", naturalization and deportation and removal; and be prepared with solutions for your client by avoiding a conviction, making a plea that doesn't trigger immigration consequences, as well as how to ameliorate any such consequences. This class is not an "immigration law" class; it is designed to help a criminal attorney effectively defend his clients who happen to be aliens. <i>Criminal Pre-Trial Practice</i>	FL-CRIM-311	2	<b>CRIMINAL PRE-TRIAL PRACTICE:</b> The purpose of this course is to expose students to an aspect of criminal practice that occupies most of the time of most criminal attorneys: pretrial practice. We will work through many of the major aspects of pretrial practice, which may include case intake (witness interviewing, charging decisions), grand jury practice, indictments, arraignments, discovery, pretrial motions, pretrial detention hearings, and plea agreements.
