<i>Florida Law Overview</i>	FL-BARP-315	1	<b>FLORIDA LAW OVERVIEW:</b> This course is designed to test knowledge and skills that every lawyer should be able to demonstrate prior to becoming licensed to practice law, such as the ability to (1) identify legal issues raised by a hypothetical factual situation; (2) separate material which is relevant from that which is not; (3) present a reasoned analysis of the relevant issues in a clear, concise, and well-organized composition; and (4) demonstrate an understanding of the fundamental legal principles relevant to the probable solution of the issues raised by the factual situation. <i>Interviewing &amp; Counseling</i>	FL-DSRL-305A	1	<b>INTERVIEWING &amp; COUNSELING:</b> This course will teach the basic skills involved in interviewing and counseling clients in a law office. The first hour of each day will be spent discussing the assigned topic/reading. This will be followed by students conducting simulated interviews and/or counseling sessions that allow them to "practice the skill." The last half hour of each day will be devoted to critiquing. <i>Taking and Defending Effective Depositions</i>	FL-DSRL-311	1	<b>TAKING AND DEFENDING EFFECTIVE DEPOSITIONS:</b> The ability to take and defend depositions effectively, and to prepare clients and witnesses for deposition are critical, yet often overlooked Simulation essential to every advocate. Good depositions can make a case, while bad ones can blow it. <i>The Art of Negotiating Sports and Related Business Contracts</i>	FL-SPEN-320	2	<b>The Art of Negotiating Sports and Related Business Contracts:</b> The course provides students specific techniques in negotiating multimillion dollar contracts of professional athletes with teams, and other entities. The techniques have application to other business professionals beyond sports. <i>Criminal Pre-Trial Practice</i>	FL-CRIM-311	2	<b>CRIMINAL PRE-TRIAL PRACTICE:</b> The purpose of this course is to expose students to an aspect of criminal practice that occupies most of the time of most criminal attorneys: pretrial practice. We will work through many of the major aspects of pretrial practice, which may include case intake (witness interviewing, charging decisions), grand jury practice, indictments, arraignments, discovery, pretrial motions, pretrial detention hearings, and plea agreements. <b>Experiential Credit</b>	Coll, M. <i>Family Based Immigration Simulation</i>	FL-FAML-308I	2	<b>FAMILY-BASED IMMIGRATION SIMULATION:</b> The course will cover the most important aspects of family-based immigration, including (among other things): eligibility to immigrate based on family relation; consular processing; adjustment of status; Child Status Protection Act; consequences of unlawful presence; filing effective waiver applications; and ethical issues related to a family-based immigration practice. Students will prepare a mock family based immigration filing and participate in a mock family based interview.
