<i>Conflict of Laws</i>	FL-DSRL-319A	2	CONFLICT OF LAWS: This course involves the study of the relationship between the location of persons and property, transactions or events and the determination of the relevant law. More specifically, this course will consider two major subjects: first, the approaches used by courts to identify the applicable state, federal or foreign law that will be applied to resolve a dispute with multistate elements and second, the extent to which a judgment entered in one jurisdiction can be enforced in another jurisdiction. <i>Florida Divorce Practice and Procedure</i>	FL-FAML-302	2	FLORIDA DIVORCE PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE: This is a nuts and bolts class designed to introduce you to Florida divorce practice. You will learn to research the applicable procedural rules and substantive Florida law related to divorce, support, and custody. As part of the requirements, you will draft a fee agreement, a divorce complaint, an answer, a family law financial affidavit, interrogatories, subpoena for production of documents from a non-party, a child support guidelines worksheet, a motion for temporary support, an order for temporary support, a motion for hearing before a master, marital settlement agreement, and a final judgment of dissolution of marriage. The course is designed to mirror a law firm experience and will be based on a hypothetical. <i>Interviewing & Counseling</i>	FL-DSRL-305B	2	INTERVIEWING & COUNSELING: This course will teach the basic skills involved in interviewing and counseling clients in a law office. The first hour of each day will be spent discussing the assigned topic/reading. This will be followed by students conducting simulated interviews and/or counseling sessions that allow them to "practice the skill." The last half hour of each day will be devoted to critiquing. One day will be entirely devoted to arranged videotaped half-hour interviews. <i>Veterans Benefits Clinic</i>	FL-GOVT-999	2	VETERANS BENEFITS CLINIC: This is will be a two credit, Simulation development lab course that provides students with an opportunity to develop interviewing and counseling Simulation, collaborative team building Simulation, and advocacy writing Simulation in representing military veterans before the Department of Veteran's Affairs (DVA). Specifically, the students will assist disabled veterans in developing their claims for compensation for submission to the DVA at the Decision Review Officer (DRO) level. Due to the extremely complex and unusual nature of the veteran's disability system, students will be given instruction on the DVA disability rating system, how DVA adjudicates veteran's claims, key legal concepts for various common disabilities and basic interviewing and counseling Simulation. Students will then plan, organize, and conduct an interview with a veteran with the Instructor after reviewing the initial DVA Regional Office decision denying benefits. The student will then work with the veteran along with the Instructor with the goal of assisting the veteran by preparing a brief for submission to the DVA DRO. Students will be evaluated on the Simulation they develop and utilize in representing the veteran. <i>Law and Popular Culture</i>	FL-SPEN-311	2	LAW AND POPULAR CULTURE: This course will closely critique film and television representations of lawyers, judges, and the legal system generally. The main course goals are (1) to develop an understanding of the important relationship between law and the culture of which it is a part, (2) to gain an appreciation of the crucial role that popular culture – particularly the portrayal of lawyers in movies and on television – plays in undermining or enhancing the legitimacy of the legal system, and (3) to better understand legal ethics and professionalism (as embodied in the ABA Model Rules) by examining the conduct of some famous lawyers in film and television. In addition to a significant amount of film viewing and discussion, the class assignments will include reading and discussion of selected ABA Model Rules and some essays on law and popular culture.
